All our new teachers and staff members are excited to be at HPSA and look forward to getting to know the students and families.



Sixth grade math students are off and running this year! They have already learned about adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing with decimal numbers. Also, students have taken their first test. Decimals are part of the "real world," and we have put extra focus on ways they are used every day. During our next unit, students will be learning some neat divisibility tricks as well as ratios and rates in the "real world." Honors and advanced-honors classes will be working on ratios, rates, and unit rates as well as fractions, decimals, and percents. All sixth grade math students have homework at least four times a week. Please be sure to go over your child's homework with him/her to make sure it is completed each night. If we work together, we can help ensure the sixth grade year will be a successful one for your Helfrich Park child!

The year is off to a great start! In English, students have been working with nouns and pronouns. They have also been working with narrative writing and the writing process. In

literature, classes have been studying the elements of fiction within different stories including *Greyling* and *Stray*. They will continue to work with plot and the other elements while reading fiction texts.

In social studies, students have been working on geography and its basic parts. They are looking forward to a great rest of the school year!

Some of the sixth grade recently took a trip to USI where they were instructed by a college professor and had the opportunity to experience science with a hands-on lab. All 6th graders will have the opportunity to go to USI for a science lab at some point during the school year.

7TH GRADE M&MS

Mrs. Todd and Mr. Hartmann want to thank the Helfrich Park families for a great start to seventh grade math. We met many wonderful students and parents at the annual Back-to-School night. An initial placement test has been given to determine strengths and weaknesses. Students are currently working on integer addition, subtraction, multiplication, and Exponents and factors are just on the horizon. As always, we continue to encourage daily practice homework and develop mathematical skills.

Mrs. McDurmon's math 7H classes started off the year with Math Olympics. Ask them about it! Students will be studying integer and rational number operations and then moving on to order of operations. The students are doing a great job...keep it up!

Mr. Whipkey's Eastern World social studies classes are reviewing the five themes of geography before moving on to study the history of Eastern World cultures. Mrs. Antey's social studies classes started the year out studying "Social Studies Basic and Geography." The next unit of study will be "The World's People," which includes the world's population, governments, and cultures.



The ELA students are off to a great start. We have reviewed point of view and plot structure using a variety of selections. The students are beginning a novel. We have begun a narrative essay unit working on sentence structure and editing.

The 7th grade science teachers, Mrs. Deal, Mrs. Dillow, Mrs. Jarrell, and Mrs. McDurmon, are excited to begin the new school year. In the beginning, we will focus on the scientific method and the metric system. These units cover process standards necessary for the rest of the year and in future science classes. Students will be conducting experiments using metric measurements. We hope they come home and share what they're learning in class!

8TH GRADE G8TORS

Science is off to a great start! After covering lab safety, we are excited about our upcoming units on the scientific method and the metric system. Students will cover important concepts necessary for understanding and successfully completing this year's science units. Students can look forward to doing many lab activities in the next few weeks, such as, the Metric Olympics and using paper airplanes to demonstrate understanding of the scientific method. U.S History students in Mr. Whipkey's class began the year with a quick review of the 50 states and capitals. Later, students will begin the study of the original 13 colonies and how our great nation was birthed. Mrs. Antey's "We the People" classes have concluded their studies of Unit One, "The Foundations of Government" and are moving onto Unit Two, "What Happened During and After the American Revolution." Very soon, students will be divided into their Unit teams! The kids are very excited to find out who they will be working with and what they will become the experts on this semester!

The G.8.T.O.R.S. are off to a great start in math and looking forward to a bright and rewarding year. We are trying to establish good study and work habits to set the tone for the year. Teachers have been working to develop Common Formative Assessments for the Problems of Practice in Professional Learning Communities. We are modeling how to use data to help drive instruction and help students succeed. Students have been determining how to tell the difference between rational and irrational numbers. The ELA team is off to a great start! Students are already getting refresher courses on parts of speech, working on theme, and are demonstrating their writing skills. In literature class, students have already read two short stories and next week, will begin their first novel, *The Outsiders*. Widgets/gadgets running on your desktop or having your wallpaper rotate images, takes away from your overall battery performance.

If a student does not have an internet connection at home, they should be able to access the public library's internet system or use school's access during Flex Period. Students should ask their teachers if they could download the needed materials for assignments offline at home and then upload their completed work the next morning during homerooms.
